Notable Reference

Field Guide to Tidal Wetland Plants

The University of Massachusetts Press has just published "Field Guide to Tidal Wetland Plants of the Northeastern US and Neighboring Canada". The book emphasizes plant identification and provides simple, easy-to-use keys and descriptions for identifying over 700 species found in the region's salt and brackish marshes, tidal freshwater marshes and swamps, tidal flats, rocky shores (including dominant algae), beaches, and coastal ponds. It is illustrated with line drawings of approximately 550 species. The guidebook also contains a brief introduction to coastal wetland ecology and overviews of coastal wetlands in each state (Maine through Maryland) and maritime province and Quebec, including figures showing the general distribution of coastal marshes in these areas and a list of places to explore these wetlands.

SocMon Global Report

SocMon is an initiative aimed at helping coastal managers better understand and incorporate the socioeconomic context into coastal management programs. The initiative is being implemented at the global and regional levels. The new SocMon Global Report synthesizes data from close to 14,000 household interviews in 29 countries. The downloadable report highlights dependence on coral reefs by local communities in developing countries, provides information on perceived threats to coastal resources, and points to the inability of coastal managers to effectively implement decades-old recommendations as a significant barrier to coral reef protection.

Greenhouse Gas Equivalencies Calculator

The greenhouse gas equivalency calculator can help us understand just what reducing carbon dioxide emissions by 1 million metric tons means in everyday terms. This equivalency calculator may be useful in communicating your greenhouse gas reduction strategy, reduction targets, or other initiatives aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

National Archeological Database Reports Module

The National Archeological Database, Reports module, is an expanded bibliographic inventory of over 350,000 reports on archeological investigation and planning, mostly of limited circulation. This "gray literature" represents a large portion of the primary information available on archeological sites in the U.S. Since a majority of the publications in the database are unpublished, uncataloged, and have limited circulation, it is important to know where a copy of the report can be found. Therefore, two Results Types are available for search results. The Standard results type formats each citation in the style of the American Antiquity journal. The Expanded results also includes the location of the report and the name of the lead agency that sponsored the project. Since some of the contact information for the report location changes over time, you can check the websites for the State Historic Preservation Offices and the State Archaeologists.
